The objective of Subsig is to encourage and to help all, especially young people, and those of limited means to a greater knowledge, love and care of the countryside, to develop their self-reliance and independence, and to promote their physical health and education by spending more time in the open air through participation in skiing, snowshoeing hiking, canoeing, camping, bicycling, mountaineering and allied activities.

MESSAGE FROM THE TRIPS DIRECTOR

Many SSOC members are also active in other outdoor organizations such as AMC, RMC, WODC, and social media groups. So what makes SSOC unique from these other organizations? You decide for yourself, but here's what some others from the past and present share.

Members embrace the thrift and convenience of using the SSOC cabin. The cabin is the reason that many members join SSOC.

Members embrace the objective and values of the SSOC. The contributions from generations of volunteers created the SSOC, acquired property, and built a cabin so that everyone can access the region to pursue outdoor activities, especially those with limited means.

The cabin can be described as "glamping". Most members find it to be a warm, comfortable, and relaxed place to "base camp" for day trips and backpacking. It has electricity, gas cooking, heat, a furnished common area with a fireplace, a dining area, and fully equipped kitchen.

Trips are run on a pleasantly informal level. SSOC relies on members to use their best judgement. No one is told to do tasks. Rarely is someone not pitching in. The best guide is the feeling at the end of a trip that you did your fair share, or perhaps even a little more.

Each trip is a unique experience. Trip leaders have a lot of freedom to coordinate their own activities. Members are welcome to join or do their own thing.

Not everything that makes SSOC unique has appeal to everyone. Sleeping is upstairs dormitory-style in your own sleeping bag or bedding on club mattresses. The cabin has no running water, internet, or cell service. While clean, lighted, and warm, outhouses are outhouses.

SSOC is a non-profit organization comprised of volunteer members that operates solely for members and by members. Along with that come some challenges and trade-offs. Volunteering requires a big investment of time. Members of diverse backgrounds and viewpoints must come to an agreement on how to operate and sustain the SSOC.

The SSOC has overcome these challenges and others for more 70+ years because of members like yourself. To all, happy and safe holidays. Hope to see you at the cabin at some point.

SPECIAL NOTICES

Everyone:

You can expect snow and icy condition around the cabin. You will likely have to clear paths between the parking area, the cabin, and the outhouse. Consider having a shovel and sand/ice melt in the trunk. No precautions can completely prevent people from spreading, contracting, or transmitting contagious diseases. Please don't go to the cabin if you feel unwell or have a contagious disease that can spread to others in a group setting. Contact the trip leader with questions, comments, or concerns.

SSOC activities are inherently dangerous. Know the risks of the activities before participating. The weather and conditions at the cabin and in the region are notoriously unpredictable and can be dangerous. In remote regions with limited or no cell service, slips and falls, vehicle crashes, injuries, frostbite, hypo/hyperthermia, are serious and ever-present risks. Contact the trip leader for questions, concerns, or suggestions.

The club's purpose is to encourage and help you develop your self-reliance and independence. SSOC trip leaders and event coordinators can help participants, but you must assume responsibility for your own safety and be self-reliant for any activities in which you participate.

Participating in SSOC activities promotes education and develops skills, but you are responsible for having the knowledge and skills necessary to participate in SSOC activities. SSOC does not offer formal educational programs, certified instructors, or guided activities. SSOC does not train nor certify trip leaders as instructors, hike leaders, or guides. SSOC partner organizations can offer this and use the cabin as a base camp. If you have not hiked or skied the Whites in the winter, please consider them. Contact the Trips Director for more information.

Hikers/Back Country/Ice climbers:

Leave a hike plan with the cabin host, especially if you are going solo. Consider or renew a hike/safe card. They expire 12/31/2023.

Trip Leaders:

Have a reaction plan. Know what to do if someone gets injured. Know what to do if someone doesn't come back or check in within a couple hours after sunset. Make sure participants can get back into the cabin when you are not around. Contact the Trips Director with questions, concerns, or suggestions.

The cabin can take a couple hours to warm up. And don't forget to flip the heating switch before going home.


SOME NEWS FROM PAST TRIPS
