Nancy Neyhard lent me a treasure trove of past bulletins and correspondence from the past 25 years. They make for great reading, and I got to work scanning them. When the scanning is done, the digitized versions will be uploaded to the Subsig Google Drive. The reading provided a look back in time and an interesting insight to Subsig.

- The hard work and generous donations of core groups of volunteers are an integral part of the Subsig legacy. Reading their words from years ago was wonderful. Some still resonate today. Some reflected a different era or the predominate interests of members at the time.
- This made me smile. 25 years ago, the club elders were telling the next generation that in their day Subsig was more active, the group was closer-knit, and times were better. It's almost verbatim what the current generation hears from their elder veterans, and what the next generation can expect to hear from the current generation. It's the way of the world. Roll with it. You'll understand better when you get up in years.
- This did not make me smile. Membership was about 3x the current roster 25 years ago. Looking back, the trajectory of membership, volunteer hours and Cabin Usage had started and continued as a slow fade across multiple generations with peaks and valleys in between.
- The Cabin rebuilding was fascinating to learn about. The "crisis management" was phenomenal!
- Something worth noting. Even though folks had to meet face to face (no Zoom back then,) open meetings were held to discuss topics of interest and concern. Open meetings appear to have been standard practice for some periods and abandoned or not mentioned in others.
- Believe it or not, Subsig went through a lot of changes! I had to pinch myself to believe it. One can only imagine those lively discussions. Some changes were big, some small. Some timely, some not. Some effective, some not. Some changes became traditions while others fell to progress and the diversity of member interests. One can learn from history, but it's not always worth repeating.
- The adoption, drafting, editing, and continuity of a bulletin remains a mystery. While director roles included everything from watersports to assistant trips director, nothing on communications/bulletin. It just chugged along until it didn't. Probably a direct result of diminishing volunteer capacity.
- The method of capturing past trip news hasn't changed much. Very big shout out to Chris Curtiss and others who dedicated time to plagiarize the logbook in the past. Try it a couple times to fully appreciate what it takes. Chris inspired me to use the "trip news" as both a bulletin and method of capturing Subsig history real time. 25 years from now you can use your name or other search elements (i.e. newest member, work weekend, etc.) to find what may be of interest to you. One day AI might write the dang thing. For now and as in years past, the content really depends on a trip leader giving the Bulletin editors something to work with. Anything in an email saves beaucoup hours of volunteer time: going to the Cabin, taking photos of the logbook, transcribing text, editing content into

MEMBER EDITORIAL FROM GEORGE HOOVORKA

Coming in from the cold.

A favorite memory of mine, dating back to my earliest time with the club, was to sit down with the cabin log book after a long, wet day of hiking in the cold. Log book on my lap, warm cup of tea in-hand. Usually on the couch facing the big picture window with Mount Hopeless in the background and our beautiful gardens down below.

While editing the Cabin Capers for this latest edition, those memories were brought back into view: Denise and Garish driving up in a cold rain to find the cabin so inviting and magical. Memorial Day in the 40's & Dave was really cold but happy to be back to the warmth of our cabin. Steve, when he washed-up in the cold water of the gorge and so happy to be back.

That physical warmth and our cultural warmth are so characteristic of Sub Sig and in contrast to what lies ahead. Let me explain: I've participated in trips organized through social media: Both local walks and the 4000 Footers. The common theme of these hikes is lack of cohesion. If you've hiked this way, I think you know what I mean.

The metaphor which comes to mind is trying to use a summer-weight tent in a severe storm in January. While great for a hot summer evening, it just falls apart in the middle of winter.

That's how I view social media hiking and the storm ahead due to the forces of Artificial Intelligence. Some say we'll feel its effects in 2027. If January 1st of 2027 is the beginning of a very long duration blizzard then we are currently in late September. We can see the leaves starting to fade and feel the stiff breezes in the cold autumn air starting to take hold.

May 15 – 17, 2025 Trail Maintenance Weekend




May 23 - 25 Memorial weekend

June 6-8, 2025



UPDATES

Refrigerator circuit.

Steve ran a new electrical wire from the circuit box to the refrigerator outlet. The self-defrost mode draws 4.5 amps and can still pop the breaker. When the self-defrost mode is off, the fridge draws 2 amps and does not pop the breaker. The fridge is running ok with the self-defrost mode off. It continued to run fine on the July 4th trip. The microwave was left where it is. When it is on the counter next to the fridge, people using it get in the way of those preparing group meals. It also took up coveted counter space.

Pests.

Only 4 mice caught in the traps this Spring. Keeping brush, debris, and old logs 25 feet from the Cabin seems to help. Also, please clean the vegetable oil bottles when returning them to the cabinet. Oil on the outside of the containers can attract them.

Fire Pit.

It is really starting to take shape and getting used. Even have a bench for it now. With all the wet weather, fire danger is less of a concern than last year. Nonetheless, please pay attention to the NFS fire warnings and do not let flying embers start a brush fire.

Debris pile at the Cabin entrance:

The pile is diminishing, thank you! If you can take a little and dispose of it properly after a trip, great. If not, no worries.
